Returning veterans from the last season's varsity football team are scarce, but coach Carl Mitchel of Balboa is confident that the experience of those who are back will play an important part in the final team standings.

Included in the probable starting line-up are such familiar names as Don Hillebrandt, center; Talisua Niko, right guard; Gordon Pomeroy, right tackle; Dave Tyree, right end; and Bill Rathburn, fullback. Promising JV's who are on the varsity team this year are Tom Ito, quarterback; Wayne Lawrence, end, and Rich Ristow, tackle.

Balboa suffered many unfortunate injuries to its star players last year, which greatly handicapped their efforts during the season. Without these injuries, the final picture might have been quite different in regard to school standings.

"This year," says Coach Mitchel, "the team is 'green,' but the

players are confident and have been practicing hard, showing much potential power."

One of the causes of the team's "greenness" is that they have lost outstanding players such as Russ "Zing-Zing" Zeller, Ron Guptil, Guido Mandoli, Bob Stables, Jim Poppin, Happy Gilbert, Ron Prioste, Ron Taylor, George Petty, and Fred Nelson by the graduation route.

Men whom Coach Mitchel considers to be the most dangerous to opposition as well as helpful to Balboa's offense and defense, in addition to last year's veterans, are: Rich Diodati, back; Dave Ferretti, tackle; Willard Holman, back, who is only a sophomore; Mario Valario, center; Rich Ristow, big 200 pound tackle; and Andre Meyer, Tackle.

With a strong defense and a good offense, Coach Carl predicts that the Buccaneers will be a threat to all other teams in the A.A.A. league.


